2015 – Woodbridge Football, The 92nd Season

It's all over. The 92nd Woodbridge Football Season has come to a close. The Woodbridge Barrons of 2015 have registered a (6-4) record, 264 points scored (26.4 per game) and 171 against (17.1 per game).

They finished in 4th place with a record of (5-3) against GMC White Division competition, and a record of (1-0) in Non-Conference competition.

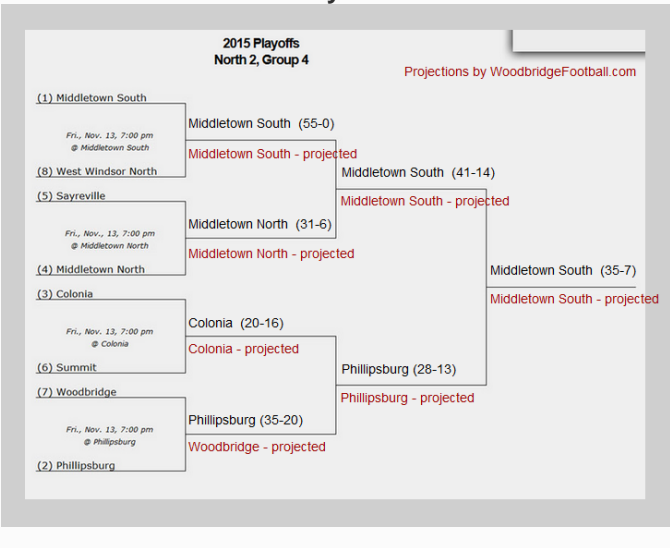

Old Bridge's Jake Esposito 2015 Borden's Baller of the Year

Jake Esposito looked around at the players assembled for a group photo and realized what an honor it was to be the recipient of the first annual Borden's Baller of the Year award.

"Everyone here was definitely worthy of it," the Old Bridge High School football star said during one of two photo shoots to celebrate the accomplishment of Esposito and his peers. "It's a big-time award. It means a lot to me."

Esposito was one of 24 players from the Greater Middlesex Conference who MyCentralJersey.com football analyst Marcus Borden selected to represent their respective schools as a Borden's Baller award recipient.

Those players' names were placed on an online ballot at MyCentralJersey.com, where readers could vote for one candidate to be Borden's 2015 Baller of the Year.

Esposito garnered the highest percentage (42.8 percent) of the 54,567 votes cast, outdistancing runner-up Tracy Fudge of Woodbridge for the honor.

While all 24 players each received a specially designed Nike long-sleeved shirt with the Borden's Ballers logo on the front and the names and schools of each of the honorees on the back, along with a framed certificate of achievement, Esposito also received a plaque commemorating his selection as Borden's 2015 Baller of the Year.

The Old Bridge school community – renowned among the best in the state when it comes to supporting student-athletes – rallied behind Esposito, who credited the students and faculty for voting in droves, enabling him to win the award.

“Our town definitely loves us,” Esposito said of the township’s support for the football program. “You can feel it walking around the hallways. Everyone just has our back and it feels good that everyone is there for us.”

One of the conference’s most dynamic players, Esposito rolled up a team-leading 1,954 all-purpose yards while leading Old Bridge to an 8-4 record and helping the Knights reach a sectional final for the first time in 14 years.

Old Bridge’s season ended with a disappointing loss to South Brunswick in the Central Group V championship.

“Despite losing the game, it was definitely a win for Old Bridge,” Knights head coach Anthony Lanzafama said, noting the support his team received at Rutgers University’s High Point Solutions Stadium, which reflected the turnout to which Old Bridge has grown accustomed on Friday nights.

“We get tremendous support across the board from the faculty, the student body, the administration, the board of education, the mayor and the town council. Football games have become a community event.”



Esposito was the Knights' leading receiver, catching 41 passes for 712 yards from highly touted sophomore quarterback Artur Sitkowski, who holds scholarship offers from Rutgers and Maryland. He also rushed 86 times for 579 more yards. As a specialist, Esposito amassed 373 kickoff return yards and 272 punt return yards. He scored a team-high 15 touchdowns. On defense, he led the Knights with four interceptions and also recorded 43 tackles.

"Jake is one of the GMC's most dominant two-way performers," Borden said. "He can beat you with his power, speed and hands as a runner, receiver, kick returner – or he will tackle you one-on-one, forcing you to hang on to the ball as he tries to rip it out."

Lanzafama said Esposito, who excels on both sides of the ball and special teams, epitomizes Borden's passion for the game and what the Baller of the Year award represents.

"Jake is a pure football player," Lanzafama said. "His passion for the game was demonstrated through his play."

Following are thoughts from Borden, a member of the NJSIAA and NJFCA Hall of Fame, on each of the Baller's Award recipients, as well as a list of his honorable mention candidates.

Red Division

East Brunswick – Kyle Wiggins: "The most unassuming athlete on the field, Kyle has that ability to jump cut, wiggle and burst, qualities that we look for in all the great backs. He was the go to guy for the Bears"

Edison – Dajour Freer: "The unheralded lineman help the Eagles win a triple overtime thriller in monsoon conditions versus East Brunswick the first weekend in October. His consecutive blocks on a counter trap play allowed teammate QB Haaziq Daniels to score the tying touchdown and the eventual two-point game winner."

J.P. Stevens – Rashiek Harvard: "The Shiek was the most impressive of the Hawks trying to revive the proud Stevens tradition. His work ethic, intensity level and senior leadership were essential to setting the tone for his youthful teammates."

Monroe Township – Miles Shipp: "The nephew of New Jersey great Marcel Shipp, current Jets running backs coach and former All-State RB from Passaic County Technical Institute, University of Massachusetts and Arizona Cardinals/Houston Texans RB from 2001-08, did not disappoint as he kept the family name in the spotlight. His combination of speed, size and outstanding leaping ability has made him one of the GMC's top wide receivers."

North Brunswick – Zach Rowell: "A bring your 'lunch pail' to work type of athlete, Rowell fits the mold of players that new head coach Don Zsak is looking for to rebuild North Brunswick's football program. Zach's punishing blocking and running style epitomizes the Raiders philosophy of playing tough defense and running a smash mouth offense."

returner or he will tackle you one on one forcing you to hang on to the ball as he tries to rip it out.”

Piscataway – Elijah Barnwell: “The league’s leading rusher runs with power and speed. He has already rewritten the Chiefs storied history and record books as a running back while only being a junior. He will be one of New Jersey’s most highly recruited players in 2016!” Piscataway High School football team’s scrimmage against

Sayreville – Anthony Porcaro: “A large, imposing two-way lineman, Porcaro will knock you down or run right past you. His prowess as a wrestler enhances his ability to disrupt an opponent’s blocking scheme, whereas his brute strength and power will overwhelm the defender as he locks you up.”

South Brunswick – Phil Campbell: “A hybrid strong safety/outside linebacker Campbell will be a great addition to the Rutgers 2016 recruiting class. He possesses outstanding athleticism which enable him to play coverage and as well as blitz the edge as a weak side college linebacker. His best days are yet to come.”

White Division

Bishop Ahr – Dane Lupton: “A cerebral player, Lupton can play multiple positions on either side of the football. He possesses enough speed to beat you outside and has the toughness to get the short yardage between the tackles. Defensively Dane can play OLB or SS depending on the defensive game plan.”

Carteret – Sam Kamara: “Sam Kamara has been a dominant force at defensive end for the past two seasons. A 2014 All-Area selection, he cannot be blocked by one person. Most offenses wisely choose to run away from him. The 255 lb. fullback is quite agile and almost impossible to stop on 4th and short.”

Colonia – Solomon Manning: “Manning, like Phil Campbell, is another home grown linebacker and a member of the Rutgers 2016 recruiting class. He has those steely eyes of a seek and destroy middle linebacker that will make sure you know who hit you. He will be a force to be reckoned with in the Big 10.”

J.F. Kennedy – Cristian Cardosa: “Cardosa has battled through early season injury to lead the young Mustangs on both the offensive and defensive line. A relentless defensive stalwart, he can over power you with a bull rush or beat you with a quick first move often making the tackle in the opponent’s backfield.”

New Brunswick – Maurice Ffrench: “The Pittsburgh commit just may be the most dynamic player in the GMC! He has literally burst on the scene this year in just about every facet of the game. He has been dominant as a rusher, receiver, kick returner and even as a punter. However, it is not his kicking prowess that worries opposing coaches, but the threat of him taking it to the house should there be an errant snap. Ask the Ramblers of Carteret about that one!”

Perth Amboy – José Caceres: “Amboy’s most dominant two-way lineman, Caceres uses his quick feet on defense to get off the line of scrimmage while always finding the ball. His powerful leg drive as an offensive blocker has consistently allowed him to open holes for Panther ball carriers.”

Football Coach of the Year

South Brunswick's Joe Goerge

Veteran mentor Joe Goerge has enjoyed success at all of his coaching stops, but his latest run with the current

group of seniors at South Brunswick High School has distinguished itself from the rest.

The Vikings, led by an outstanding class of upperclassmen – the talent level of which Goerge has not previously had the privilege of coaching – rebounded from a season-opening loss to win 11 consecutive games en route to claiming their second sectional championship in four years.

South Brunswick steamrolled to a 42-0 drubbing of Old Bridge in the Central Group V final at Rutgers University's High Point Solutions Stadium earlier this month.

All facets of South Brunswick's strengths were on display in the lopsided victory: a solid running game, a skilled passing attack, sound blocking schemes, quick-strike ability, stellar defense at all three levels and impressive special teams play.

Goerge, who credits the players and his assistant coaches with the program's success, is the architect of South Brunswick's 11-1 season, and as such, is the Home News Tribune's 2015 Football Coach of the Year.

"The staff was outstanding and these guys (assistants) work hard," said Goerge, noting the team began working on its championship season following a loss to Manalapan in last year's Central Group V final. "These are guys that really love to coach."

Goerge began his high school coaching career as an assistant in 1974. He served as the head coach at Port Richmond in Staten Island from 1982-91, as the head coach at Franklin from 1992-2004 and as the head coach at Dayton from 2005-11.

The veteran mentor took over at South Brunswick in 2012, leading the school to its first sectional title with a 33-22 victory over rival Manalapan (Goerge previously won two sectional crowns at Franklin).

Under Goerge, the Vikings have been among the state's most consistent public school programs, posting a 39-8 record (.830 winning percentage). South Brunswick has won 19 consecutive games against Greater Middlesex Conference foes, last losing to a Red Division school (Sayreville) in 2013.

"Talk about an even-keeled group of guys," Goerge said of this year's South Brunswick squad. "They never got too up, never got too down. This group of seniors is unique in their talent and ability, unique in their attitude and in just their style."

South Brunswick's talent level is reflected in the conference-best nine players who were selected to the Home News Tribune's All-Area team. The Vikings placed five players on first team, including Defensive Player of the Year Phil Campbell, and four more on second team.

"We really pushed these kids," Goerge said. "I think the expectations on our part and their part were very high this year. I don't know if I ever had a group deliver as well as these guys have. It's one of the best groups we've ever been involved with. They did the things they had to do in the offseason, in the summer. They earned it."

After squandering a 15-point lead in a season-opening loss to Middletown South, which culminated its undefeated campaign with a 35-7 victory over defending North 2 Group IV champion Phillipsburg for that sectional title, the Vikings went on to outscore their next 11 opponents 392 to 100 or by an average of 26.5 points per game.

South Brunswick used a 51-yard halfback option touchdown pass to erase a three-point deficit late in the fourth quarter of a 14-10 comeback victory over Piscataway on the state playoff qualifying weekend and defeated Manalapan 27-21 in the sectional semifinals with a touchdown pass on the game's final play.

"If I had to look at one play, that option pass in that Piscataway game just kind of epitomized (South Brunswick's quick strike-ability)," Goerge said. "We just had a feeling we were going to make a play to win it."

"You never know game to game, but with this team you just felt confident you were going to make some plays."

RB Maurice Ffrench, New Brunswick, Sr.

The Pittsburgh commit, who added Rutgers to his list of 10 scholarship offers last week, was the conference's most dynamic performer. Ffrench led the GMC with 727 receiving yards on 28 catches. He was also the league's third-leading rusher, rolling up 1,375 yards on 106 carries. Ffrench had 15 rushing touchdowns, five receiving touchdowns, two kickoff returns for scores and two punt returns for scores. He is the Home News Tribune's Offensive Player of the Year. As a defensive back, Ffrench registered 55 tackles, 11 pass deflections and two interceptions.

RB Elijah Barnwell, Piscataway, Jr.

Barnwell set Piscataway's career rushing mark of 3,890 yards while grinding out 1,757 yards and 23 touchdowns on 249 carries this fall. He ranks second among the school's single-season leaders in carries, yards and touchdowns. The workhorse back also established the school's single-game mark with 44 carries for 215 yards in a playoff loss. On defense, Barnwell recorded 41 tackles including a team-high 15 for a loss.

RB Jake Esposito, Old Bridge, Sr.

Voted Borden's Baller of the Year, Esposito rolled up a team-leading 1,954 all-purpose yards. He was Old Bridge's leading receiver with 41 catches for 712 yards. He also rushed 86 times for 579 more yards. Esposito had 373 kickoff return yards and 272 punt return yards. On defense, he recorded 43 tackles, a team-high four interceptions and a fumble recovery. Esposito led the team with 15 touchdowns.

OL Nick Krimin, St. Joseph, Sr.

The Rutgers commit was a physically imposing lineman at 6-foot-6 and 323 pounds. He was surrounded by a host of talented players including defensive back Joe Papa and fellow lineman P.J. Barr, who both had outstanding seasons for the Falcons. With Krimin up front, St. Joseph's young skill position players were able to develop. Krimin is widely regarded among the nation's top offensive tackles.

DL Terrell Hagans, Piscataway, Jr.

The offensive guard and defensive tackle was one of the few lineman who played on both sides of the ball for a deep Piscataway team. The 6-foot, 310-pound junior keyed a rushing attack that averaged a Greater



Middlesex Conference-leading 235.1 yards per game. On defense, Hagans played on the interior, where he recorded five tackles for a loss and recovered a fumble. He was arguably the area's best two-way lineman.

OL Richie Hoff, South Brunswick, Sr.

With Hoff leading the way, South Brunswick averaged 197.5 rushing yards and 127.3 passing yards en route to its second sectional championship in four years. In addition to being a key member of the offensive line, Hoff also starred at linebacker, averaging 6.7 tackles per game. In South Brunswick's first seven contests, Hoff recorded two fumble recoveries, an interception and a caused fumble.

OL Lou Vacca, Spotswood, Sr.

With Vacca anchoring the line, Blue Division champion Spotswood passed for 1,332 yards and rushed for 1,608 more. He was among the division's leaders with 12 tackles for a loss including two sacks on defense. Vacca also recovered a fumble and caused a fumble.

OL Anthony Porcaro, Sayreville, Sr.

Just when the Bombers started to click and hit their stride offensively, quarterback Jayson DeMild was lost to a season-ending injury after Week 8. The one constant for Sayreville, however, was Porcaro's effort in the trenches. He helped pave the way for 1,773 yards and 23 touchdowns on the ground.

TE Devin Miller, Metuchen, Jr.

With an offer from Rutgers, where his brother Dorian is a starting offensive lineman, Miller was Metuchen's second-leading receiver with 18 catches for 259 yards and a team-high four touchdowns. He was even used as a fullback in short yardage situations, scoring four rushing touchdowns. Miller recorded 41 tackles (six for a loss), a team-high three sacks, two fumble recoveries and an interception.

WR Samad Starling, Linden, Sr.

The athletic receiver and defensive back had a phenomenal year on offense and in the secondary. He caught 45 passes for 707 yards and 11 touchdowns and also rushed 15 times for 100 yards and another score. The strong safety registered 57 tackles and two interceptions.

WR Quasim Glover, Woodbridge, Jr.

The area's leading receiver, Glover caught 46 passes for 723 yards and eight touchdowns. He averaged 15.7 yards per catch including a 70-yard touchdown reception. On defense, Glover registered 32 tackles and a team-high four interceptions, one of which he returned for a score. Glover also had six pass deflections.

K Jon Sot, St. Joseph, So.

The second-year starter, who followed in the footsteps of Brayn Rafano (Wagner) and Michael Cintron (Rutgers), continues St. Joseph's tradition of stellar kickers and punters. He converted 24 of 26 extra points and booted two field goals including a 43-yarder that was among the state's longest this season. Sot also starred at receiver, catching 17 passes for 358 yards and four touchdowns. He projects to be one of the conference's best baseball players this spring.

KR Nick Sodano, Old Bridge, Jr.

The diminutive running back rushed for a team-leading 983 yards and 11 touchdowns on 176 carries. He averaged 5.6 yards per attempt. Sodano was second on Old Bridge with 1,216 all-purpose yards including a 90-yard kickoff return for a touchdown against Piscataway. He also recorded 46 tackles and a sack.

ATH Tracy Fudge, Woodbridge, Sr.

The gifted quarterback completed 115 of 200 passes for 1,499 yards and a GMC-leading 17 touchdowns. Fudge also had three rushing touchdowns. He finished the year with 1,575 all-purpose yards. Fudge was responsible for 20 of Woodbridge's 38 touchdowns. He helped lead the Barrons to the playoffs for a second consecutive season.

GMC with 117 tackles including 62 solos. Manning also had a sack and an interception. As a receiver, he caught 11 passes for 231 yards and three touchdowns.

LB German Pimentel, New Brunswick, Jr.

Pimentel, who could play defensive end or outside linebacker, used his height (6-foot-5) and athleticism to create havoc in opposing backfields. He posted a GMC-best 19 sacks and recorded 78 tackles. Pimentel also had three pass deflections and an interception. He starred at tight end, catching five passes for 135 yards and three touchdowns.

DB Chase Barneys, Colonia, Sr.

Barneys paced Colonia's secondary with 47 tackles and a sack. As a quarterback, Barneys completed 98 of 173 passes for 1,370 yards and 12 touchdowns. He also rushed 152 times for 877 yards and 11 touchdowns. Barneys finished with 2,247 all-purpose yards.

“Early on I thought he could be one of the most dominant players in the Greater Middlesex Conference and he was just that,” MyCentralJersey.com football analyst Marcus Borden, an NJSIAA and NJFCA Hall of Fame mentor, said about Ffrench. “ He's just a dynamic player who can play so many positions.”

Besides his amazing athleticism, the other thing that made him so great was his ability to turn negatives into positives.

In a regular-season game against Carteret, Ffrench lined up as a punter. A bad snap sailed over his head, but he didn't falter. Ffrench scooped it up and jetted downfield weaving through the opposition to score.

“He gets one block and the next thing you know he's down the field with tremendous speed,” Borden said. “He has a great football IQ.”

Ffrench's list of accomplishments this season is almost innumerable. He led the GMC with 727 yards receiving and amassed 1,375 rushing yards. He tallied 24 touchdowns and helped lead his team to a playoff run for the first time in almost a decade.

The Zebras ended their season 9-2 after they were ousted by Old Bridge, and managed a 7-1 record in the White Division. A remarkable turnaround from the 3-7 record they posted in their 2014 campaign.

Scout.com ranks Ffrench as the number two running back in the state behind Kareem Walker of De Paul Catholic High School. Ffrench is ranked eighth in the East and 63rd in the nation.

"He's an incredibly dynamic athlete," national recruiting analyst for Scout.com, Brian Dohn, said. "You give him the ball and generally he'll make good things happen. He's so creative and he's so hard to tackle in small spaces. He could have two great bursts of acceleration and once he's in the open field you're not catching him."

Borden noticed Ffrench as early as his sophomore year. Even then it was obvious that the running back would do big things.

"Back then it was quite evident that he was a great talent," Borden said. "He was a jack of all trades. He could play multiple positions and he just didn't come off the field."

"His best days are ahead of him," Borden said. "He's an electrifying player."

In June of this year Ffrench committed to the University of Pittsburg, and has since been made an offer by Rutgers University. Army, Buffalo, Temple and other Division I-AA schools have also made him offers.

"This kid may have the ability to be a shut down corner in college because he's so quick and has such great instinct," Dohn said. "He's so electric with the ball in his hand that you don't want to overshadow that, but he could play in multiple positions."

Not only was Ffrench electric on the field, but he had a spark off the field as well.

"He's a really energetic young man and he's always got a smile on his face," New Brunswick head coach Don Sofilkanich said. "He's able to light up a room when he walks into it. On the field he's a very versatile athlete."

He's able to play a lot of positions and he did a lot things for us. His versatility will be greatly missed."

"That story just speaks to the kind of player that he is," MyCentralJersey.com football analyst Marcus Borden, an NJSIAA and NJFCA Hall of Fame mentor, said about Campbell. "He doesn't take any plays off."

On defense Campbell amassed a total of 103 tackles, 62 solo and 41 assisted, averaging 10.3 tackles per game. He also recorded three interceptions. But, what made him so exceptional is that he was an offensive force as well.

He tallied 749 rushing yards and 54 yards receiving. He scored 13 touchdowns on the season.

"I call him a hybrid," Borden said. "He's a linebacker, safety type player and that's just on the defensive side. He also plays well on offense."

He helped to propel the Vikings to a near perfect season (11-1) which included a Central Group V final blowout victory, 42-0, over Old Bridge.

"He was the heart and soul of that football team," Borden said. "He kept them on the straight and narrow."

Campbell is a versatile player that can be placed in any position and excel. He can play up at the line of scrimmage, he can play linebacker and then he can drop back into the safety position.

"There are not many people that can line up and play a linebacker and then shift back into the secondary," Borden said.

Scout.com ranks Campbell as the number one safety in NJ. He is ranked fourth in the East and 32nd in the nation.

I saw Phil (Campbell) a few times when he was a junior and he was a good player," national recruiting analyst for Scout.com, Brian Dohn, said. "Then I saw him a few times as a senior and he had become a great player. It just speaks about his work ethic and his desire to get better. Most kids will give full effort on one or two plays, but he gives his all on every play."

Campbell is committed to Rutgers University with Pittsburgh, Boston College, Connecticut, Purdue, Syracuse, Temple and West Virginia all showing interest.

"I think at the college level he's going to be a straight safety," Dohn said. "I think he's physical enough to be a strong safety and I think he runs well enough to be a free safety. I think he's a strong safety, but he's going to be good no matter where they put him."

South Brunswick head coach Joe Goerge said that in his 34 years as a coach, Campbell is one of the best all around athletes that he has ever seen.

"He was just a terror out there on the field," Goerge said. "He was a competitive young man and always wanted to do his best. I think he'll do well in college because he's just a fierce tackler."

PLAYER OF THE YEAR: Defense was the staple of South Brunswick's 11-game winning streak that propelled the Vikings to a Red Division title and the Central Jersey, Group 5 championship. At the heart of it all was safety Phil Campbell.

Even playing as a defensive back, Campbell made his presence known across the field, routinely making his way to the ball near the line of scrimmage. He led the team with 103 tackles, while also grabbing three interceptions. His presence helped set the tone for a unit that allowed 11.8 points per game, and that average dipped to 9.1 during the team's 11-game winning streak.



Along with his contributions on the defensive side, Campbell's leadership and talent spilled over to the offense, where he set the tone in a versatile running game. Campbell led the Vikings in rushing with 765 yards, and he found the end zone 14 times this season. He broke the 100-yard mark three times, and he tallied three touchdowns in a game twice along the way.

Campbell stamped the team's 42-0 state final win over Old Bridge with a touchdown run, giving him 90 yards on 17 carries for the day. He also made seven tackles while helping the team post its second shutout of the season.

TEAM OF THE YEAR: South Brunswick suffered heartbreak in 2014 when it lost in the Central Jersey, Group 5 final, but it was a different story in 2015. After a season-opening loss to Middletown South, the No. 1 team in the NJ.com Top 20, South Brunswick rattled off 11 straight victories, capturing the GMC Red Division title and the Central Jersey, Group 5 championship by beating Old Bridge, 42-0, in the final.

South Brunswick again displayed its dominance within the conference, extending its winning streak to 19 game against GMC competition. It survived tough regular season test against Old Bridge, winning 20-9 on the road, and it clinched a division title with a 14-10 comeback win over Piscataway at home.

The Viking defense was at the heart of South Brunswick's run, allowing 11.8 points per game, and that average dipped to 9.1 in South Brunswick's 11 wins. Phil Campbell and Mohamed Jabbie anchored a lightning-fast secondary that wrecked havoc on opposing passing attacks, plus swarmed up to stop the running game. Campbell also led the team in rushing with 765 yards and 14 touchdowns, leading a balanced attack with Wendell Allen and Josh Liao. Liao, a junior quarterback, threw for 1,476 yards and 16 touchdowns against just three interceptions.

COACH OF THE YEAR: It had been a while since New Brunswick tasted the success it had in 2015, and head coach Don Sofilkanich helped guide the team to its best finish in almost a decade.

The Zebras went 9-2, reaching that many wins for the first time since 2006 and finishing above .500 for the first

time since 2009. Sofilkanich's team set the tone right off the bat, winning its first seven games of the season to ensure a playoff appearance. The team's lone regular season loss came to division rival Colonia, but New Brunswick was still able to secure a share of the GMC White Division title.

New Brunswick bowed out of the postseason in the semifinals of the Central Jersey, Group 5 playoffs, falling to Old Bridge. Despite missing out on a trip to the final, New Brunswick wrapped up a strong campaign paced by 1,000-yard rushers. Maurice Ffrench compiled 1,375 rushing yard, 727 receiving yards and 24 total touchdowns, while Samad Davia finished with 1,333 rushing yards and 15 scores.

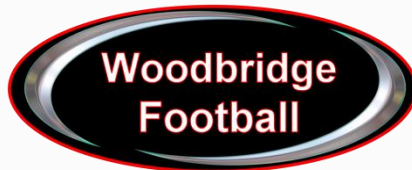

The Barrons , under the leadership of head coach Bill Nyers, concluded another successful season with a 6-4 record and 5-3 in the GMC White Division. The team qualified for the playoffs for a second consecutive season. This was the fifth time in school history that the Barrons qualified in back to back seasons (16th appearance). The number of winning seasons increased to 52 in school history. The number of school wins increased to 451.

On an individual basis, several athletes have climbed the school's milestone charts.(top ten)

1. Nate Lanier made the list for "most total touchdowns in a season" with 12 in 2015. Nate is now tied for tenth place with three other alumni.
2. Nate Lanier is now tied for 5th.place on the "most total touchdowns in a career " list with 23. This is based on 2, 9, and 12 TD's during his three varsity years.
3. Quaasim Glover, with another season to go, is now tied for 4th place on the "most total touchdown receptions in a season list" with 8 in 2015.
4. Quaasim Glover is now in 6th place and climbing on the "most total touchdown receptions in a career "list with 11. This is bases on 3 and 8 during his two year varsity career.
5. Quaasim Glover's 46 receptions in 2015 gives him 4th place on the "most pass receptions in a season" list. He was already 3rd on the list from his 50 receptions last season.
6. Quaasim Glover's 96 career receptions gives him 3rd place and climbing on the career list.

7. Quaasim Glover's 723 receiving yards this season gives him 5th place on the "most yards on pass receptions in a season" list.
8. Quaasim Glover's 1, 432 career receiving yards places him 3rd. on this list and climbing.
