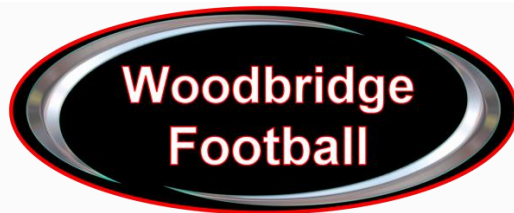

Colts Neck (0-2) at Woodbridge (2-0): As expected, the passing combination of quarterback Tracy Fudge (27 of 39 for 351) to wideout Quaasim Glover (15 receptions, 209 yards) has produced, but Woodbridge's success can also be attributed to its defense and special teams play. Dylan Leone (19 tackles) and James Modica (15 tackles) pace an opportunistic defense that has returned two interceptions for scores and created seven turnovers. Specialist Kashaun Henry has returned 11 kickoffs for 472 yards. He and backfield mate Nate Lanier, who leads the Barrons with three touchdowns, are dangerous. Former NFL player Darian Barnes, who won a Super Bowl in 2002 with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, was named Colts Neck's interim head coach last season after the team went 0-8, getting outscored 262-70 along the way including a 21-12 loss to Woodbridge that snapped the Barrons' own 10-game losing streak and propelled them to the North 2 Group IV semifinals. Colts Neck's lone 2014 win came in the season finale over Hightstown, which Rich Nyers, Woodbridge mentor Bill Nyers' brother, coached. Colts Neck is coming off a 20-13 loss to Howell and a 30-0 defeat to Red Bank.

After graduating several key starters, Woodbridge High School football coach Bill Nyers, whose team is ranked No. 4 in the Home News Tribune Top 10, was hoping his defense could pick up where it left off a year ago.

The Barrons completed a remarkable turnaround last season, snapping a 10-game losing streak in Week Three and going on to qualify for the NJSIAA playoffs while finishing with a 7-4 record after falling to eventual

sectional champion Phillipsburg in the North 2 Group IV semifinals.

An opportunistic Woodbridge defense was among the Greater Middlesex Conference's leaders in takeaways last season, recovering 15 fumbles and intercepting eight passes.

Despite graduating eight defensive players who combined for 457 tackles a year ago, Woodbridge's defense has been stellar thus far, limiting each of its first two opponents to one touchdown while rolling to a 28-6 victory over incumbent Central Group II finalist Carteret and a 38-7 win over incumbent Non-Public Group III playoff qualifier Bishop Ahr.

"We did lose a bit but I think it's a tribute to the players and the defensive staff," Nyers said, referring to assistant head coach Kevin Coleman, linebackers coach Joe Liquori and special teams coordinator/outside linebackers coach Jason Ali.

"They come together to put in different packages that enable the kids to be successful and take advantage of what they can do. They really do a heck of a job with breaking down tendencies."

Woodbridge, which had five defensive touchdowns last season, had two pick sixes in its season opener against Carteret.

Against Bishop Ahr, Alex LaGrippa, one of the top returning defensive players, recovered two fumbles and Christopher Powers blocked a punt. The turnovers provided the Barrons' explosive offense with a short field with which to work.

4. Woodbridge (2-0): Quarterback Tracy Fudge threw three touchdowns and connected on three two-point conversion passes, while Quaasim Glover had two touchdown catches and 120 receiving yards in a 38-7 win over Bishop Ahr on Friday night.

5. Colonia (2-0): Chase Barneys completed 10-of-16 passes for 304 yards and four touchdowns and ran for another score as the Patriots defeated Kennedy for the sixth year in a row with a 39-18 triumph on Friday night.

6. Sayreville (2-0): Outside linebacker Jahsim Floyd returned an interception 30 yards for a touchdown, while free safety Brandon Cenci had a scoop and score on a 40-yard fumble return in a 22-6 win over North Brunswick on Friday night.

7. New Brunswick (2-0): Maurice Ffrench rushed for 171 yards and two touchdowns and the Zebras held South Plainfield to just 26 yards of offense in a 27-12 victory on Friday night.

8. Edison (1-1): Haaziq Daniels completed 16 of 31 passes for 226 yards, while running back James Stewart

carried 13 times for 144 yards and a touchdown in a 45-27 loss to Old Bridge on Friday night.

9. South Plainfield (1-1): Ruben Torres had two kickoff returns for 176 yards and a touchdown in South Plainfield's 27-12 loss to New Brunswick on Friday night.

10. Middlesex (2-0): Ryan Coke carried 12 times for 129 yards and three touchdowns, caught two passes for 26 yards and also recorded an interception that was converted into a score as the Blue Jays defeated Point Pleasant Beach on Friday night.

Woodbridge football rallies to defeat Colts Neck

Woodbridge 41, Colts Neck 13: After spotting the opposition a 13-0 lead, the Barrons parlayed a defensive touchdown, a special teams score and some big plays on offense into a 34-13 lead early in the fourth quarter.

After quarterback Tracy Fudge scored on a keeper with 7:28 left in the first half, he connected with Quaasim Glover on a 70-yard scoring strike to make the score 13-13 with 5:45 remaining in the second quarter.

Nate Lanier's 3-yard touchdown plunge gave the Barrons a 20-13 lead, their first lead of the night and one they would not relinquish.

Glover followed with an interception return for a score – his second pick six of the season – as Woodbridge built a 26-13 with 27 seconds left in the third quarter.

Keshaun Henry's 50-yard punt return made the score 34-13 with 9:29 left in the game. Henry added a 50-yard touchdown run with 4:23 remaining to produce the final margin.

Football: Woodbridge overcomes early deficit to move to 3-0

Despite falling behind by two touchdowns in the first half, [Woodbridge](#) was unfazed, rallying for a 41-13 cross-conference victory against [Colts Neck](#) on Friday night in Woodbridge.

After Colts Neck jumped ahead 13-0, Woodbridge got a pair of touchdown runs from quarterback [Tracy Fudge](#) and wide receiver [Quaasim Glover](#) to even the score.

Glover later scored on an interception return for a touchdown, sparking a big second half for the Barron defense. Keshaun Henry returned a punt for a



touchdown, while Woodbridge did not surrender another point after the two first-half touchdowns.

Henry also tacked on a 50-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter to finish off the scoring.

Woodbridge moved to 3-0 with the win, and it will return to White Division play next week when it hits the road against Perth Amboy. A key divisional matchup is looming on Oct. 9, when Woodbridge is slated to travel to New Brunswick, which also improved to 3-0 on Friday night.

We're going to be brothers forever'; teammates, coaches mourn Warren Hills QB

Several cards were placed among the flowers at a memorial at Warren Hills' football stadium – one branded with a large Superman emblem.

It was clear on Saturday morning that Evan Murray was a superhero, and more, to the Warren County community.

The high school senior died on Friday night after being injured during a home football game against Summit. Faculty, students, friends and family gathered at Warren Hills to mourn and remember the teenager who'd touched so many people.

"Everyone honored him, and they should because he deserves it," said Anthony Veneziano, a classmate of Murray, as he left the stadium. "They should continue to honor him forever."

The specific circumstances of Murray's death weren't revealed by school district administrators on Saturday. The Blue Streaks community, in the meantime, is grieving.

"It was complete shock," said Veneziano, who attended Friday night's game and was on the basketball and baseball teams with Murray. "He's one of the greatest kids in this whole community. It's unbelievable. I still don't believe it."

Murray was a three-sport performer, gifted with versatile athleticism. It was his character, however, that drew peers toward the senior.

"There's a lot of things that I'm going to remember about Evan, mostly his leadership and the young gentleman that he was," baseball coach Mike Quinto said, "not just an athlete, but the person he was."

"He was one of the best leaders," said Veneziano, who noted that Murray was honest and levelheaded. "He believed in us. He got the job done in all three sports." The teenager was also dedicated, filling his free time with football, basketball or baseball, according to Quinto. "That's just the way he was, and he would lead others to do the same, and that's why we love him," he said. Quinto, who also coaches boys soccer at the school, said the Warren Hills students are devastated. It's another blow to a community that has been hard-hit by tragedy of late.



Colin Matthew Cudworth Jr., a 17-year-old Warren Hills student, died in an auto accident in July. Kinsey Fredericks-Bishow, a 2012 Warren Hills graduate, died after contracting bacterial meningitis while studying abroad in Paris over the summer.

“The (students) that I met with here today are having a tough time,” Quinto said. “The baseball players that I spoke with, I just told them to please stick together; that we’ll get through this. We’ve dealt with some tragedy throughout the last year and we’ll get through this one, too.”

“They lost a leader and they lost somebody that ... a lot of kids look up to, and a lot of staff and teachers look up to,” Quinto said.

The Blue Streaks have lost their Superman, but more importantly, they’ve lost part of their family.

“He was a brother to us,” Veneziano said. “We’re all brothers. We’re going to be brothers forever.”
