Phillipsburg Stateliners!



It's time to slay the opponent!

The Stateliners (7-1) are a talented team that has a structured and disciplined approach to their game plan, and they have in the past handed the Barrons (5-3) setbacks every time they have faced them. But that doesn't mean that success cannot be attained, it simply means determination and a different tactical approach is required, and that approach is fourfold.

First, to seek and destroy the most valuable assets they put on the field on EVERY play while on defense. The Stateliners have three of those assets.

#13 Manny Romero, 5'11" - 175#, RB
 #2 Jaquan Jones, 5'10" - 170# RB.
 #11 Yusef Shelton, 6'00" - 185#, WR

Jones (7 TD) and Romero (4 TD) account for 75% of all rushing yards and 11 TDs. Shelton (1 TD) and Romero (5 TD) account for 78% of all receiving yards and 6 TDs. But undoubtedly, Romero is the engine that makes the wheels move. He has 4 Rushing TDs, 5 Receiving TDs and 2 KOR TDs. He has quickness and speed, and if special attention isn't devoted to stopping him along with Jones and Shelton, it will get ugly.

Second, is to take advantage of what is given on offense. Phillipsburg plays a straight up 4-4-3 defense. The 4 DL are big and physical and running inside the tackles will be difficult. The 4 LBs fill their gap assignments at the line of scrimmage and the outside backers are capable of moving out to cover slot receivers. Finally, there is the 2 DBs and 1 FS. The secondary plays off the ball and drop steps at the snap. The secondary, have a combined 17 INTs with 288 yards of returns with 2 TDs. Throwing over the top isn't going to work in their base defense. Executing what the Barrons offense is capable of doing underneath will create positive yards. Adjustments can be made if and when the Stateliners fill the box or press, but they are absolutely vulnerable.

Third, Special Teams has to become the game changers. On KO and P, kicking away from the potential threats, Romero 244 yards on 6 KO returns with 2 TDs, Jones 180 yards on 8 KO returns is critical. If that means kicking out of bounds and letting them start at the 35 or the spot, it is better than watching #13 take one to the house. PATs and FGs of 30 yards or less are also a critical part of defeating the Stateliners. Missed scoring opportunities may be the difference between winning and losing.

And fourth, turnovers have to be minimized, while takeaways maximized.

Here is something to ponder. In their first eight games, Phillipsburg has scored 278 (34.8 pg), Woodbridge 216 (27.0 pg). Phillipsburg has allowed 113 (14.1), Woodbridge 122 (15.2 pg). The only common opponent was Hillsborough. Phillipsburg defeated the Raiders 28-21 in a regular season game, while Woodbridge registered three scores to one in a controlled scrimmage. Lastly, Phillipsburg has played against teams with a record of 26-38, and the Barrons 28-36.



The Phillipsburg Stacheliners are a formidable team. And so are the Woodbridge Barrons. It's time to slay the opponent!.

1. South Brunswick (7-1): Phil Campbell rushed for 122 yards on 11 carries, recorded 11 tackles and sealed a 14-10 victory over Piscataway with an interception in the closing seconds, while Justin Shorter caught a game-winning 51-yard halfback option touchdown pass from Wendell Allen late in the fourth quarter. Next: Bye.

2. Old Bridge (5-2): Jake Esposito had a 48-yard touchdown reception, a 2-yard scoring run and intercepted a pass, while Artur Sitkowski completed 16 of 28 passes for 204 yards and two touchdowns in a 21-6 win over Monroe. Next: Piscataway, Friday, 7 p.m.

3. Sayreville (5-3): Coray Williams rushed 12 times for 180 yards and three touchdowns in a 33-13 victory over East Brunswick, which proved costly for the Bombers, who lost star quarterback Jayson DeMild to a season-ending right fibula fracture. Next: Edison, Friday, 7 p.m. Sayreville quarterback Jayson DeMild out for season with fracture

4. Piscataway (5-2): Despite 213 rushing yards on a season-high 35 carries from Elijah Barnwell, the Chiefs lost a heartbreaker for the second consecutive week, allowing the winning score on a halfback option pass late in the fourth quarter en route to a 14-10 loss to South Brunswick. Next: at Old Bridge, Friday, 7 p.m.

5. Colonia (6-2): Bashir Lauderdale rushed for a career-high 226 yards and three touchdowns on 32 carries as the Patriots rolled to an impressive 45-27 victory over New Brunswick, giving themselves a shot to claim the

GMC White Division title with a victory over South Plainfield. Next: South Plainfield, Friday, 7 p.m.

6. New Brunswick (7-1): Maurice Ffrench, who entered the game as the GMC's rushing leader, was limited to 22 yards on nine carries but did score on a 70-yard kickoff return, while Samad Davila carried New Brunswick offensively with 125 rushing yards and two touchdowns in a 45-27 loss to Colonia. Next: at St. Joseph, Saturday, 1 p.m.

7. South Plainfield (6-1): The Tigers, who were limited to 78 yards from scrimmage, needed Jason Lee's 80-yard kickoff return and a subsequent two-point conversion for an 8-6 victory over Perth Amboy. Next: at Colonia, Friday, 7 p.m.

8. Woodbridge (5-3): Tracy Fudge, who completed 17 of 28 passes for 173 yards, threw a four-yard touchdown pass to Quaasim Glover with eight seconds left in the Barrons' thrilling 27-25 comeback victory over St. Joseph. Next: Bye.

9. St. Joseph (3-4): The Falcons, who have lost their last two games by a total of seven points, received 189 passing yards from Paul Coccoziello, but squandered a fourth-quarter lead for the second consecutive week in a heartbreaking 27-25 loss to Woodbridge. Next: New Brunswick, Saturday, 1 p.m.

10. Metuchen (6-1): The Bulldogs, who were idle, travel next to defending GMC Blue Division champion Spotswood in a rematch of last year's winner-take-all game for the division title. Next: at Spotswood, Saturday, 1 p.m.

NORTH JERSEY 2, GROUP 4 PLAYOFF PICTURE
In the field: The eight teams for the North 2, Group 4 field are set. [Middletown South](#), [Phillipsburg](#), [Colonia](#), [Sayreville](#), [Summit](#), [Middletown North](#), [Woodbridge](#) and [West Windsor-Plainsboro North](#) will make up the field.

Seeding scenario: Middletown South will be the top seed. Phillipsburg can at worst be tied for the second seed, and it will officially lock in with a win, or a Franklin win, or a St. Joseph (Met.) loss. Colonia is in line to take the third seed barring a tie with Phillipsburg. Middletown North can jump up to the fourth seed if it defeats Middletown South in Week 9, but a loss would slot them in the fifth or sixth seed based on residual points. Sayreville would be the fourth seed if Middletown North lost, while Summit appears destined for the fifth seed, unless Middletown North can make up ground in residual points. Woodbridge and West Windsor-Plainsboro North are locked into the seventh and eighth seeds, respectively.

Rahway and 11 GMC football teams qualify for NJSIAA playoffs

Three high school football games – each decided in dramatic fashion during the final minute over the weekend – catapulted two teams into the NJSIAA playoffs and left another out of postseason consideration.

Edison and Rahway won their respective games to qualify, while Metuchen dropped a heartbreaker to miss the postseason by a single power point.

A total of 12 teams from the Home News Tribune area have qualified for the playoffs.

The NJSIAA will announce official playoff pairings and consolation matchups for non-qualifiers on Sunday.

The eight teams with the most power points in each section qualified for the playoffs, which commence with first-round games on Friday and Saturday at the site of the higher seed.

The semifinals will be contested on the weekend of Nov. 20-21, also at the higher seed, while the public school sectional finals and non-public school group championships will be played on the weekend of Dec. 3-5 at neutral sites to be determined.

Rahway, under the direction of first-year head coach Brian Russo, a former Woodbridge mentor, rallied for a 21-20 victory over Governor Livingston on Saturday, scoring a touchdown and subsequent two-point conversion with 1:05 remaining to produce the final margin.

After taking a seven-point lead with two minutes remaining, Edison had to hold on for a 20-19 victory on Friday night over Sayreville, whose potential game-tying extra point following a touchdown with nine seconds left sailed wide right.

Metuchen fell 27-24 to Spotswood on a field goal with nine seconds left. The loss not only cost the Bulldogs the Greater Middlesex Conference Blue Division

championship, but it knocked them out of playoff contention. The defeat, coupled with Rahway's win, gave Roselle enough residual points to bump the Bulldogs out of a playoff spot. Had Metuchen defeated Spotswood, it would have qualified in Central Group II as the third seed.

Some will say the fact that Metuchen (6-2) lost a playoff spot to Roselle (3-5) indicates a flawed power points system.

"The kids are heartbroken right now," Metuchen head coach Bob Ulmer said. "They played their butts off and so did Spotswood. Hats off to them. They made a couple of more plays than us."

Edison, Old Bridge, South Brunswick and New Brunswick qualified in Central Group V, while Piscataway qualified in North 2 Group V.

Sayreville, Colonia and Woodbridge will compete in North 2 Group IV, while South Plainfield and Rahway will compete in Central Group III.

Spotswood (Central Group II) and Middlesex (Central Group I) round out the field of area qualifiers.

Of all the teams that qualified, Old Bridge and Edison are the only conference foes who will square off in a first-round game. The Knights, who defeated the Eagles 45-27 earlier this year in a game that was much closer than the final score indicates, will host that game Friday at 7 p.m.

"It was very competitive," Edison head coach Matt Fulham said of the initial meeting. "Old Bridge is an outstanding program. (The Sayreville win which snapped a three-game losing streak) gives us some encouragement and a lot of positive momentum."




